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## **NORTH CARRICK COMMUNITY BENEFIT COMPANY (NCCBC)**

North Carrick Community Benefit is a community-based company (No: SC480121) with charitable recognition (No: SC045947). It has been distributing funds from Scottish Power Renewables' Dersalloch windfarm since 2015. The company focuses on the roughly 9,500 people living in the 5 community council areas in North Carrick: Crosshill, Straiton and Kirkmichael as 1, Kirkoswald, Maidens and Turnberry as 1, and then Dunure and Minishant and Maybole as the other 3 areas.

NCCBC is a membership organisation with membership open to anyone who lives in the area. It has around £300,000 available to spend on improvements in North Carrick each year.

Applications can be submitted by any constituted group that delivers benefits for people in North Carrick. Applications will be considered where they deliver new and innovative projects which promote one or more of the following priorities:

- Regeneration of our built environment for general public benefit
- Environmental Protection and improvement
- Provision, maintenance, or improvement of Public Open Space
- Projects which reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions
- Projects which promote more efficient use of scarce global resources
- Education for local residents
- Recreational activities/facilities
- Protection, preservation, or enhancement of important or significant local buildings
- Alleviating poverty



- Providing training or employment opportunities for unemployed individuals or groups
- Health benefits
- Alleviating hardship caused through health, disability, isolation or other disadvantage
- Citizenship, capacity building, engagement, volunteering and support for individuals and communities
- Arts, Heritage, or culture

## **CARRICK FUTURES**

Carrick Futures supports community projects in Carrick, South Ayrshire.

The fund supports projects primarily located within or directly benefiting one or more of the six community council areas of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry and Girvan & District.

Some funds are also available for projects located within or directly benefiting the wider Carrick area. Priority will be given to applications which also benefit one or more of the main beneficiary communities listed above.

### What Can Carrick Futures Fund?

Carrick Futures can support charitable activities that support the rural regeneration and sustainability of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry, Girvan & District and Carrick.

Awards can support a wide range of costs and activities.

The Board has agreed four strategic aims, which it will use to prioritise proposed projects. These are:

- Improving access to services (in particular public transport)
- Enabling a diverse and sustainable population mix (services for young people and older people, but also activities that help create opportunities for families and working age people to live in the area).
- Improving equality of opportunity (including tackling poverty and disadvantage).
- Contributing to a climate smarter world with sustainability at its core

Applicants must normally fulfil the following conditions to apply to the fund:

- The proposal is for projects or activities consistent with the charitable purposes of Carrick Futures;



- Applicants have a constitution (governing document or set of rules) and are set up on a not-for-private-profit basis. However applicants do not need to be registered charities to apply.
- Applicants must provide their latest set of accounts, signed by an independent third party, and a copy of a recent bank statement.

## The Daniell Trust

Funding body:	The Daniell Trust
Maximum value:	£ 250,000

Grants are available to UK registered charities and CICs for ‘more significant and sustainable’ projects that improve the health and wellbeing of children and young people (up to the age of 25 years) with complex special educational needs through connections to nature and the environment or environmental conservation projects in Great Britain.

### **Background**

The A & N Daniell Charitable Trust was founded by Tony and Noreen Daniell ‘to support charitable organisations close to their hearts’.

Traditionally, the Trust has distributed small grants but are now looking to spend the remaining assets over the next few years on a series of more significant, sustainable projects which will leave a lasting legacy to the Trust’s founders.

### **Objectives of Fund**

The funding is intended to support well managed registered charities focused on the following areas:

- The care and education of children and young people with severe learning difficulties.
- Environmental conservation, including projects with a wildlife focus combined with local community engagement.

The Trust is keen to identify projects that combine these two key areas, for example initiatives which combine environmental objectives with significant community benefit.

Of particular interest is projects that improve the health and wellbeing of children and young people with complex special educational needs through connections to nature and the environment.



This includes children and young people up to the age of 25 with physical and sensory impairments, as well as those with learning disabilities and autism. There is much evidence to demonstrate these children and young people, to their detriment, typically have fewer opportunities to be active outdoors in their everyday life. Of particular interest are autism and learning disabilities, due to the founders' own background in this area.

Funding will also be considered for schemes solely concerned with the conservation of valuable natural habitat.

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### **Value Notes**

Grants of between £50,000 and £250,000 are available for activity over one to three years.

Proposals that are part of a larger project should identify an element that will fall within the limit of £250,000 and the timeframe.

It is expected that between 10 and 20 projects will be funded.

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### **Match Funding Restrictions**

Although match funding is not required, priority will be given to projects which demonstrate match funding of 20% or over, particularly for larger scale capital projects.

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### **Who Can Apply**

Applications will be considered from UK registered charities and CICs limited by guarantee.

To be eligible, applicants must have:

- An annual turnover of at least £250,000 as published in their last annual accounts.
- A track record of running nature-based initiatives, ideally those which engage the community and children with additional needs.

CICs must meet the following additional criteria:

- Objects are compatible with the activities outlined in this application.
- Have a minimum of three unconnected directors, the majority of who must not be remunerated.
- There must be an asset lock clause that ensures funds and assets are transferred to a body with charitable objects should the CIC close.
- All documents registered with Companies House must be up to date and match the documents submitted as part of the grant application process (e.g. in respect of asset lock).
- Have a policy in place to ensure decisions on directors' remuneration are taken by the unpaid directors.
- Have a realistic up to date business plan which includes a financial forecast.

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### **Restrictions**

The following are not eligible for funding:



- Individuals
- Project costs that have already been incurred.
- Religious activity. Religious organisations who can evidence their work benefits a wider community irrespective of their faith will be considered.

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### ***Eligible Expenditure***

The funding can be used for both revenue and capital costs.

- Revenue costs can include salaries, programme or service running costs.
- Capital costs can include refurbishment, equipment and new builds.

Overhead costs directly related to delivery of the project are eligible.

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### ***Location***

England, Wales, Scotland, with priority given to projects based in:

- Anglesey and Pembrokeshire in Wales
- Shropshire and North Yorkshire in England
- West Highlands in Scotland.

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### ***How To Apply***

The guidance notes and expression of interest form can be found in the downloads section of the Daniell Trust website.

There will be one funding round in 2023.

There is a two-stage application process:

- The first step is complete an initial Expression of Interest form, preferably by email to the Trust, by the deadline of 31 March 2023.
- Shortlisted applicants will be contacted by the Trust and invited to submit a full application between 26 May 2023 and 21 July 2023.
- Final decisions will be made by early October 2023.
- Awards will be made in November 2023.

Organisations that do not hear from the Trust may take it that their application has been unsuccessful.

## **Background**

The Diverse Critics programme is provided by Disability Arts Online in partnership with Creative Scotland, The Skinny and *gal-dem*.

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## **Objectives of Fund**

The programme aims to equip a cohort of disabled and/or BPOC writers with the skills needed for a career as a professional arts writer/journalist. This includes everything from improving their writing, learning how to pitch, networking opportunities with editors and managing a portfolio career.

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## **Value Notes**

Programme participants receive a bursary of £1,500 (in addition to travel, accommodation and access costs) together with mentoring, workshops, feedback and the opportunity to have their work published.

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## **Who Can Apply**

Participants can be interested/specialise in any art form (or work cross art forms) but must be based in Scotland and identify as disabled and/or BPOC.

Three of the eight places will be reserved for participants who have a special interest in dance or contemporary live performance.

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## **Eligible Expenditure**

The programme will take place between February and September 2023 and will take the form of a series of two in-person workshops, five online workshops delivered remotely, as well as remote mentoring and writing assignments.

As media partners for the project, The Skinny and *gal-dem* are offering participants the opportunity to have their work published as part of the programme. There will also be further paid opportunities to have writing published on Disability Arts Online.

### **Background**

The Iris Prize LGBTQ+ Film Festival, established in 2007 by The Festivals Company, is an international LGBT film prize which is open to any film which is by, for, about or of interest to gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or intersex audiences.

The Iris Prize LGBTQ+ Film Festival established a fund to finance documentary films produced by emerging British LGBTQ+ filmmakers. The fund will award up to £20,000 towards a production annually for at least three years.

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### **Objectives of Fund**

The funding is intended to financially support documentary films produced by promising British LGBTQ+ filmmakers, with a specific interest in supporting filmmakers from underrepresented communities including, but not limited to, black, Asian, and minority ethnic people and women.

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### **Value Notes**

This programme will award production funding of up to £20,000 to one documentary film project annually.



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### **Who Can Apply**

Applications will be accepted from emerging British LGBTQ+ filmmakers.

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### **Eligible Expenditure**

The funding is used to finance the production of a documentary film with a running time of 22/25 minutes or 40 minutes.

OUTtv Media Global Inc will make sure that the finished film is seen by securing rights to the produced film in all media for a period of 25 years.

Grants are available to registered UK charities that work with communities in the UK for projects that address specific categories set out by the Trust each year.

### **Background**

The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust offers funding to UK registered charities whose work takes place in the UK.

The funding is intended to support those in society who face the greatest challenges and whose opportunities are the most limited.

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### **Objectives of Fund**

The Trust operates a three-year rotation system, with different fields of interests being funded each year:

- In 2022, the focus is on the Arts. There will be a specific focus in the first two rounds on people in the early stages of their career, specifically performers and creatives. The third and fourth rounds will focus on projects that seek to address the under-representation of BAME people in all sections of the arts.
- In 2023, the first two rounds will be focused on rehabilitation of prisoners, ex-prisoners, and those at risk of offending. The third and fourth round on children and young people in care and care leavers.

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### **Value Notes**

The Trust awards grants of either £1,000 or £5,000 depending on the grant round:

- Round 1 - £1,000
- Round 2 - £5,000
- Round 3 - £1,000
- Round 4 - £5,000

The level of grant awarded is determined by the income of the charity:

- Grants of £1,000 are available for charities with an operating income of between £100,000 and £1 million.
- Grants of £5,000 are available for charities with a minimum operating income of £1 million. There is no maximum level.

Charities may only apply for one grant per calendar year.

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### **Who Can Apply**

Organisations registered with the Charity Commission (England, Wales and Northern Ireland) or OSCR, or exempt from registration, can apply.

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### **Restrictions**

The following are not eligible for funding:



- Any not-for-profit organisation (eg social enterprise and community foundation) that is not a UK registered charity or organisation exempt from registration.
- Charities with an income of less than £100,000.
- Overseas projects.
- Capital projects, including churches, schools, hospitals, hospices, museums, galleries and theatres.
- Churches even when they are used by community groups.
- Schools, including activities.
- Village halls.
- Minibuses or other vehicles.
- Shopmobility.
- Charities involved with religion (including repair of church fabric).
- Charities involved with animals (welfare and conservation).
- Individuals, including individuals embarking on a trip overseas with a charitable organisation.
- Students.
- Scouts, Guides, Cubs, Brownies.
- Sea Cadets.
- Holidays, including respite holidays.

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### ***Eligible Expenditure***

The Trust operates a three-year rotation system, with different fields of interests being funded each year.

Support is available for the following priorities in **2023**:

- **Rounds 1 and 2 - Rehabilitation of prisoners, ex-prisoners and those at risk of offending.**
- **Rounds 3 and 4 - Children and young people in care and care leavers.**

Support is available for the following priorities in **2024**:

- Rounds 1 and 2 - Disability.
- Rounds 3 and 4 - Disability.

The project must fall within the relevant category for the year the application is submitted and organisations may only make one application during any one year.

Round 1 of 2023 is now open until 28 February 2023.

### **Background**

Kellogg's, an American multinational food manufacturing company headquartered in Battle Creek, Michigan, United States, manufactures a range of foods, including cereals and cereal bars.

Kellogg's European headquarters, and the home to its largest factory, is based at Trafford Park in Trafford, Greater Manchester. This has been in operation since 1938.

Kellogg's started to support school breakfast clubs across Britain in 1998 and since then has provided £4 million of investment to schools.

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### **Objectives of Fund**

Kellogg's, in partnership with Forever Manchester, is awarding grants of £1,000 to school Breakfast Clubs, to help them provide breakfast to those children who need it most.

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### **Value Notes**

Grants of £1,000 per breakfast club are available.

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### **Who Can Apply**

Eligible breakfast clubs must be based in a school in England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland.

A limited number of grants are available with priority being given to schools that **either:**

- Have 35% and above of children eligible for pupil premium funding (for England) and eligible for free school meals (Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales); **or**



- Are based in an area which is classified as falling in the 10% of most deprived areas according to the Index of Multiple Deprivation. Applicants should check their postcode on the Kellogg Breakfast Club Grants - Indices of Deprivation Information [page](#)

Only one grant per school in each academic year is available.

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### **Restrictions**

Schools that have received breakfast club funding from Gregg's or Magic Breakfast within the current academic year will not be considered a priority for support.

Fee paying schools are not eligible for funding.

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### **Eligible Expenditure**

All schools that apply to the Programme will be automatically signed up to the Kellogg's Breakfast Club Network. Through the Breakfast Club Network, Kellogg's will contact schools with offers and information to help their Breakfast Club.
