NORTH CARRICK COMMUNITY BENEFIT COMPANY (NCCBC)

North Carrick Community Benefit is a community-based company (No: SC480121) with charitable recognition (No: SC045947). It has been distributing funds from Scottish Power Renewables' Dersaloch windfarm since 2015. The company focuses on the roughly 9,500 people living in the 5 community council areas in North Carrick: Crosshill, Straiton and Kirkmichael as 1, Kirkoswald, Maidens and Turnberry as 1, and then Dunure and Minishant and Maybole as the other 3 areas.

NCCBC is a membership organisation with membership open to anyone who lives in the area. It has around £300,000 available to spend on improvements in North Carrick each year.

Applications can be submitted by any constituted group that delivers benefits for people in North Carrick. Applications will be considered where they deliver new and innovative projects which promote one or more of the following priorities:

- Regeneration of our built environment for general public benefit
- Environmental Protection and improvement
- Provision, maintenance, or improvement of Public Open Space
- Projects which reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions
- Projects which promote more efficient use of scarce global resources
- Education for local residents
- Recreational activities/facilities
- Protection, preservation, or enhancement of important or significant local buildings
- Alleviating poverty



- Providing training or employment opportunities for unemployed individuals or groups
- Health benefits
- Alleviating hardship caused through health, disability, isolation or other disadvantage
- Citizenship, capacity building, engagement, volunteering and support for individuals and communities
- Arts, Heritage, or culture

CARRICK FUTURES

Carrick Futures supports community projects in Carrick, South Ayrshire.

The fund supports projects primarily located within or directly benefiting one or more of the six community council areas of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry and Girvan & District.

Some funds are also available for projects located within or directly benefiting the wider Carrick area. Priority will be given to applications which also benefit one or more of the main beneficiary communities listed above.

What Can Carrick Futures Fund?

Carrick Futures can support charitable activities that support the rural regeneration and sustainability of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry, Girvan & District and Carrick.

Awards can support a wide range of costs and activities.

The Board has agreed four strategic aims, which it will use to prioritise proposed projects. These are:

- Improving access to services (in particular public transport)
- Enabling a diverse and sustainable population mix (services for young people and older people, but also activities that help create opportunities for families and working age people to live in the area).
- Improving equality of opportunity (including tackling poverty and disadvantage).
- Contributing to a climate smarter world with sustainability at its core

Applicants must normally fulfil the following conditions to apply to the fund:

- The proposal is for projects or activities consistent with the charitable purposes of Carrick Futures;



- Applicants have a constitution (governing document or set of rules) and are set up on a not-for-private-profit basis. However applicants do not need to be registered charities to apply.
- Applicants must provide their latest set of accounts, signed by an independent third party, and a copy of a recent bank statement.

DESTINATION SOUTH AYRSHIRE

Community Based Coronation Events

Objectives of Fund

The programme seeks to support makers who may be starting out on their journey in craft or at the point where they want to turn a hobby into a career, or where they are already be a maker who is looking to further develop their heritage craft skills.

Value Notes

Bursaries valuing up to £4,000 are available.

Who Can Apply

Applications will be accepted from individuals based in the United Kingdom.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Exhibitions or other awareness-raising activities.
 - Writing publications or books.
 - General living expenses.
 - Marketing activities, website development etc.
 - Buying specialist tools or materials.
 - Buying books and study materials.

Eligible Expenditure

Bursaries can cover or contribute towards:

- The costs of training with a crafts person.
 - The costs of attending a specialist training course.
 - The costs of attending an accredited training course.
 - Undertaking a self-directed programme of training with one or more crafts people.

Benefact Trust – Building Improvement Grants

Funding body:	Benefact Trust

Grants are available for Christian charities, churches, cathedrals, and denominational bodies across the UK to support the conservation, preservation, or aesthetic enhancement of Christian churches and charity buildings.

Background

The Building Improvement Grants Fund is provided and administered by the Benefact Trust.

Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to provide essential support to protect and enhance Christian church and charity buildings, ensuring their continued use and viability, and the safeguarding of their heritage.

Value Notes

There is no minimum or maximum award specified. Funding will be awarded at the discretion of the trustees.

Match Funding Restrictions

Applicants are expected to have secured at least 30% of their total project costs before applying.

Who Can Apply

This programme is open to churches, cathedrals, denominational bodies, and Christian charities.

Organisations that have previously received funding under the General Grants Programme will have to wait two years before making an application.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Educational institutions such as schools or theological institutions.
- Regular maintenance works.
- Work that is normally covered by insurance.
- Retrospective costs.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding can be used to support direct capital costs relating to the following types of work:

- Essential, one-off repairs or other capital works to ensure the continued use or viability of a building (capital work must be considered urgent or necessary within 12 months).
- Minor capital works or equipment purchases to meet operational or accessibility requirements (eg essential operational equipment, AV equipment, hearing loops, ramps etc).
- Conservation or restoration of historic features (eg stained glass, carvings, interior, furnishings, clocks, tower bells, organs etc) that contribute to the preservation and appreciation of a building's heritage.
- Other aesthetic enhancements (eg interior decoration, furnishings or public realm improvements) to improve indoor or outdoor spaces for users.
- Energy efficiency/renewable energy measures (eg heating/lighting upgrades, solar panels etc) that improve the sustainability of church buildings/facilities and enable their continued use.

Location

United Kingdom and Ireland.

How To Apply

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The average decision time for smaller grants (up to £25,000) is two months. Larger grants (over £25,000) are considered at grants committee and board meetings and can take between four and six months.

Richard and Siobhán Coward Foundation - Grants for Analogue Photography

Funding body:	Richard and Siobhán Coward Foundation

Background

The Grants for Analogue Photography programme is provided by Richard and Siobhán Coward Foundation, a small, privately funded, charitable foundation established to honour the life and work of Richard Coward.

Objectives of Fund

With the aim of preserving traditional photography practices, the funding is intended to support projects that are reliant on analogue techniques for their realisation.

Value Notes

Grants of between £250 and £1,000 are available.

Normally, projects benefitting from these grants would be expected to last for up to one year's duration, and be implementable within the year of the grant being awarded.

Match Funding Restrictions

The Foundation can fund up to 100% of costs, but normally expects its contribution to be matched either by other funding or in-kind contributions.

Who Can Apply

Applications are accepted from individuals at any stage of their photography career. Applications will also be accepted from a partnership or group coming together for the duration of a project.

The Foundation will give preference to projects which explore, expand and experiment with analogue techniques and which push boundaries. The more creative and imaginative the project is, the more likely it is to be successful.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Applications from organisations.
 - Projects that have already started.
 - Preservation of an archive of analogue photographs.
 - Projects which have been designed to sustain a predominantly commercial, profit-making photography practice.

Eligible Expenditure

The funding is used to support projects including those which:

- Preserve or revitalise traditional analogue photographic techniques.
- Develop analogue photographic techniques in creative, imaginative or innovative ways.
- Share learning and skills in the practice of analogue photography.
- Raise public awareness of analogue photography as an art form.



For the purpose of these grants, analogue photography is defined as the predominantly film-based processes that were used before the development of digital photography. Examples include:

- 35mm and medium format film photography.
- Wet plate collodion.
- Polaroid.
- Tintype.
- Slide transparency.
- Pinhole camera photography.
- Camera-less processes such as photogram or cyanotype.

Projects must take place in the UK.

There is one application round annually, opening on 18 January each year. The deadline for applications is 2 April **(12:00 BST)** each year.

Creative Scotland - National Lottery Extended Programme Fund

Funding body:	National Lottery

Grants are available for non-profit arts and cultural organisations to deliver a programme of creative activity lasting 18 to 24 months in Scotland

Background

This fund is delivered by Creative Scotland and provided by the National Lottery.

Objectives of Fund

The aim of the scheme is to create the opportunity for non-profit organisations to get longer term support than is currently available through the National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations (*covered in separate entry*).



Funding is aimed at supporting organisations which deliver programmes of activity which extend beyond their own organisation. This includes support for those delivering audience-facing programmes, as well as those whose focus is on supporting the development of other organisations, artists, creatives or specific groups.

Value Notes

Grants of £100,000 to £200,000 are available for 18 to 24 months.

Who Can Apply

Constituted non-profit organisations working in the areas of art, creativity or culture can apply.

Organisations based outside Scotland but operating with a UK-wide remit, can apply if the funding is for activity taking place in Scotland, and which will be of direct benefit to people in Scotland.

Applicants must have a bank account in the same name as the organisation.

As part of the Scottish Government's Bute House Agreement, all organisations applying for funding from Creative Scotland from 1 July 2023 will be required to pay all directly employed staff at least the Real Living Wage

Restrictions

The following cannot be funded:

- Profit-distributing companies, such as companies limited by shares or companies without a clear asset lock.
- Organisations seeking funding for activity which is not part of Creative Scotland's remit and is not related to the arts, cultural and creative sector.
- Creative Scotland's Regularly Funded Organisations (RFOs). An RFO can be cited as a partner in an application made by another organisation to the National Lottery Extended Programme Fund – but RFOs cannot apply and should not be the main beneficiary of any funding awarded.
- Organisations based outside Scotland seeking funding for activity taking place outside Scotland.
- Organisations in administration and liquidation.
- Unconstituted artists' groups, collectives or bands.
- Individuals and Sole Traders.
- One-off projects with limited outcomes.
- Retrospective costs.
- Start-up costs.
- Film, screen or TV industry projects.
- Activities related to academic studies in further education.
- General arts or creative activities in schools.
- Publishing activities that support academic, journalistic or reference work.
- Large scale building work or feasibility studies.
- Equipment costs only.
- Fundraising.



- Translation costs for international publishers.
- Self-publishing.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding can only be used for delivering a programme of artistic work or activities.

Examples of eligible activities include:

- The ongoing public programme of an arts centre, gallery, venue or creative hub, plus the resources to plan and develop this programme across 18 to 24 months.
- Two editions of an annual arts festival, or the development year and delivery year of a biennial arts festival.
- A programme of mentoring, training and/or skills development activity for artists and creative workers.
- A programme of artist residencies.
- A programme of participatory arts activity working with particular groups or communities.
- A programme of activity that includes the development of new work intended to be presented to audiences.

How To Apply

Applications can be submitted at an time before the deadline of 14 November 2023. Decisions can be expected within around 16 months of submission.

National Lottery Extended Programme Fund | Creative Scotland

Grants are available for constituted artistic, creative, or cultural organisations across Scotland to deliver a variety of creative projects and activities and enable business changes or development projects that make the organisation more financially sustainable.



Further details

Background

The National Lottery Open Fund for Organisations is provided by the National Lottery and is administered by Creative Scotland. It is an update of the Open Fund: Sustaining Creative Development Fund, which Creative Scotland administered between 2020 and early 2023.

Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to support organisations that wish to undertake a wide range of creative activities, such as:

- A specific project or production.
- A long-term programme of creative work
- A period of creative research and development.

The fund will also support groups to undertake business and organisational development that will:

- Enhance their business sustainability through the development of new or more diverse income streams; or
- Consider broader organisational costs.

Value Notes

Grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 are available for projects lasting up to 18 months.

Who Can Apply

Constituted artistic, creative, or cultural organisations based in Scotland can apply.

Organisations based outside of Scotland but operating with a UK-wide remit can apply if the funding is for the activity taking place in Scotland and for the benefit of people in Scotland.

Applicants must have a bank account in the name of the organisation and demonstrate evidence of a constituted structure.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Commercial activity where the primary purpose is to create a profit
- Activity that is not directly related to Creative Scotland's remit to support the arts, creative, and cultural sectors.
- Retrospective costs.
- Start-up business costs for new companies, and/or ongoing running costs at profit-distributing companies.
- Film, screen, or TV industry projects or activities.
- Activities that are related to academic studies in further or higher education.



- General arts or creative activities in schools.
- Publishing activities that support academic, journalistic, or reference work.
- Larger-scale building work or feasibility studies.
- Funding solely for equipment.
- Activity designed to generate a profit.
- Fundraising for other causes.
- Translation costs for international publishers.
- Self-publishing.
- Activity taking place outside of Scotland.
- Activities that would be more appropriately supported by another Creative Scotland or Screen Scotland funding programme.
- Activity that has already been supported by Creative Scotland/Screen Scotland.
- Organisations that are in administration, receivership, or liquidation.
- Non-constituted artists' groups, collectives, or bands.
- Individuals or sole traders.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is for creative projects and activities that align with the following criteria:

- Quality of ambition – Projects that develop and deliver high-quality work that reflects Scotland's diversity and distinct identity.
- Engagement – Projects that reach a range of individuals, groups, or communities, and engage with communities and professionals across the cultural and creative sector.
- Equalities, diversity, and inclusions – Projects should embed EDI in all aspects of their activities in the following ways:
 - A commitment to tackling inequalities for people who experience exclusion or are marginalised.
 - Helping to support a more diverse workforce, (including those who govern and lead).
 - Considering how to incorporate EDI in artistic and creative programming, where appropriate.
- Environmental sustainability – Projects that support Scotland's net-zero target.
- Fair Work – Projects should ensure people have fair access to opportunities to work in and progress through the cultural and heritage sector.
- International – Projects that promote Scotland as an important global centre for culture and creativity which is diverse, has strong traditional roots and has an appetite for experimentation and innovation.

Examples of the types of activities that can be funded include:

- The development, curation, production, and presentation of new work.
- Networking and collaborative opportunities.
- Research and development.
- Organisational development activity, where the activity is likely to contribute to greater organisational sustainability, greater public engagement, greater environmental sustainability, or the development of knowledge/skills within the organisation.
- Professional development, including training, mentoring, and skills development for staff, board, artists, and creative workers.
- Activity that supports artists and addresses inequalities.



- Audience development.
- Widening participation and engagement in creative activity.

How To Apply

There are no deadlines and applications are accepted at any time.

Applicants for awards of less than £20,000 will be notified of any decisions made within eight weeks of submission.

Applicants for awards of between £20,001 and £100,000 will be notified of any decisions made within 12 weeks of submission.

Background

This programme is delivered by NatureScot in collaboration with the Scottish Government and in partnership with the National Lottery Heritage Fund, and with support from the Green Finance Institute.

Objectives of Fund

Facility for Investment Ready Nature in Scotland (FIRNS) is a grant scheme supporting projects that can shape and grow the use of private investment and market-based mechanisms to finance the restoration of Scotland’s nature.

Grants will be offered to organisations and partnerships to help develop a viable business case and financial model, to attract investment in projects that can restore and improve the natural environment, such as, but not limited to:



- Woodland creation
- Marine enhancement
- Peatland restoration

Successful projects will also demonstrate the means to engage and share benefits with communities, contributing to a just transition.

FIRNS will help selected projects to bridge the gap between the conceptual idea and the investment ready proposition capable of attracting private capital and finance.

Value Notes

The programme has an overall budget of £1.8 million.

Grants of up to £120,000 are available through FIRNS. Applicants are also encouraged to apply for co-funding through project grants of up to £120,000 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, thereby increasing their access to funding of up to £240,000.

Who Can Apply

Applications are encouraged from environmental non-governmental organisations (eNGOs), community groups, land owners, farmers and other private sector organisations in Scotland, individually or in consortia.

Expressions of Interest (EoIs) are now open. The applications window will be closed by mid-June.

During the mandatory EoI phase applicants are expected to provide a short first indication of their project, the business model it focuses on and its expected benefits (social, economic and environmental). Smaller local organisations will be prioritised as well as Scottish organisations over English-based organisations offering services in Scotland.

For applications above £5,000, groups must provide a copy of their most recent audited or examined report and accounts.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Individuals.
- Building projects.

Eligible Expenditure

Priority will be given to projects relating to hospices and veterans of the armed forces.

Preference will be given to activities relating to early intervention, as well as projects that achieve their aims through sport, organised physical activity, the arts, yoga, and education.

Specific projects are preferred to general funding but contributions to the cost of employing staff, and community workers are accepted.

Summary

Bank of Scotland Foundation Invest programme is suitable for charities that can demonstrate they address disadvantage or social exclusion. This will ensure funding reaches the most vulnerable people across Scotland and provides them with opportunity and equality.

The Foundation recognises the significant impact that the current cost of living crisis is having on people across Scotland. To ensure funding can support charities through this crisis and reach those in real need, the 2023 Invest Grants Programme will provide funding for up to five years for charities.

Charities can apply for whatever is their greatest priority and area of need. For example:

- Project work e.g., a programme of work which is limited in scope and seeks to achieve particular outcomes including funding for project costs, staff costs, materials
- Core costs e.g., salary costs, utilities, and rent
- Capital costs e.g., a building project, repairs, equipment etc.

Examples of projects that can be supported include:

- Disadvantage: charities addressing primary disadvantage such as homelessness, abuse, mental health or poverty, or secondary disadvantage such as debt issues, learning disabilities, illiteracy, lack of employability skills or health issues.



- Social Exclusion: charities addressing exclusionary challenges for minorities, people with disabilities, LGBT people, drug users, care leavers, the elderly or the young.
