NORTH CARRICK COMMUNITY BENEFIT COMPANY (NCCBC)

North Carrick Community Benefit is a community-based company (No: SC480121) with charitable recognition (No: SC045947). It has been distributing funds from Scottish Power Renewables' Dersalloch windfarm since 2015. The company focuses on the roughly 9,500 people living in the 5 community council areas in North Carrick: Crosshill, Straiton and Kirkmichael as 1, Kirkoswald, Maidens and Turnberry as 1, and then Dunure and Minishant and Maybole as the other 3 areas.

NCCBC is a membership organisation with membership open to anyone who lives in the area. It has around £300,000 available to spend on improvements in North Carrick each year.

Applications can be submitted by any constituted group that delivers benefits for people in North Carrick. Applications will be considered where they deliver new and innovative projects which promote one or more of the following priorities:

- Regeneration of our built environment for general public benefit
- Environmental Protection and improvement
- Provision, maintenance, or improvement of Public Open Space
- Projects which reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions
- Projects which promote more efficient use of scarce global resources
- Education for local residents
- Recreational activities/facilities
- Protection, preservation, or enhancement of important or significant local buildings
- Alleviating poverty



- Providing training or employment opportunities for unemployed individuals or groups
- Health benefits
- Alleviating hardship caused through health, disability, isolation or other disadvantage
- Citizenship, capacity building, engagement, volunteering and support for individuals and communities
- Arts, Heritage, or culture

CARRICK FUTURES

Carrick Futures supports community projects in Carrick, South Ayrshire.

The fund supports projects primarily located within or directly benefiting one or more of the six community council areas of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry and Girvan & District.

Some funds are also available for projects located within or directly benefiting the wider Carrick area. Priority will be given to applications which also benefit one or more of the main beneficiary communities listed above.

What Can Carrick Futures Fund?

Carrick Futures can support charitable activities that support the rural regeneration and sustainability of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry, Girvan & District and Carrick.

Awards can support a wide range of costs and activities.

The Board has agreed four strategic aims, which it will use to prioritise proposed projects. These are:

- Improving access to services (in particular public transport)
- Enabling a diverse and sustainable population mix (services for young people and older people, but also activities that help create opportunities for families and working age people to live in the area).
- Improving equality of opportunity (including tackling poverty and disadvantage).
- Contributing to a climate smarter world with sustainability at its core

Applicants must normally fulfil the following conditions to apply to the fund:

- The proposal is for projects or activities consistent with the charitable purposes of Carrick Futures;



- Applicants have a constitution (governing document or set of rules) and are set up on a not-for-private-profit basis. However applicants do not need to be registered charities to apply.
- Applicants must provide their latest set of accounts, signed by an independent third party, and a copy of a recent bank statement.

Ironmongers' Company – Charitable Grants for Iron Projects

Funding body:	The Ironmongers' Company
Maximum value:	£ 5,000
Application deadline:	16/09/2023

Grants are available to charities, churches and schools in the UK to promote the craft of ironwork.

Background

The Ironmongers' Company provide charitable grants to support young people and communities, and to promote the craft of ironwork. The Ironmongers' Trust Company provides over £600,000 annually to over 100 causes and specific charities.

Objectives of Fund

Funding is intended to primarily support the conservation of historic ironwork or the creation of new decorative iron or steel work.

Value Notes

The majority of grants awarded are under £5,000.

Who Can Apply

Applications are accepted from registered charities, churches and schools for projects in the UK.

Restrictions

Grants will not be awarded for:

- Other restoration projects or for work in other materials.
- Purposes that benefit private individuals.



- Work that has already started.

Eligible Expenditure

The company prefers to fund entire projects, or specific elements of a project.

For church bells projects, only the repair/rebuilding of existing iron framesides, or the provision of new framesides cast in iron, will be considered.

How To Apply

The Company's Iron Committee meets twice a year in April and October to review grants for Iron Projects. The deadlines for receipt of applications are 31 March and 16 September respectively.

Inspiring Scotland – Autistic Adult Support Fund

Funding body:	Inspiring Scotland
Maximum value:	£ 75,000
Application deadline:	13/09/2023

Grants are available for not-for-profit organisations in Scotland to deliver projects and activities that provide support to adults with an autism diagnosis, self-identified autistic adults, and their families and carers.

Background

The Autistic Adult Support Fund is provided and administered by Inspiring Scotland. It aims to build upon the work of a pilot funded by the Scottish Government between 2020 and 2023 to provide post-diagnostic support to autistic people.

Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to help adults with an autism diagnosis, self-identified autistic adults, and their families and carers understand what neurodivergence means for them and improve their well-being.



Value Notes

A total of £500,000 is available.

Two strands of funding are available:

- Small grants of between £15,000 and £30,000 for small, grassroots, locally based projects.
- Large grants of between £30,001 and £75,000 for national or regional projects by organisations specialising in support for autistic people and their families and carers.

Match Funding Restrictions

Match funding is not a requirement.

Who Can Apply

Scottish not-for-profit organisations working closely with autistic people can apply, such as:

- Companies that are limited by guarantee.
- Scottish charitable incorporated organisations.
- Community benefit societies.
- Co-operative societies.
- Community interest companies.

Groups must have a bank account registered in the name of the organisation with two signatories.

Organisations applying for small grants should work closely with autistic people as part of the organisation's core mission.

Organisations applying for larger grants should specialise in support for autistic people and their families and carers, with good evidence on quality, and be able to demonstrate that their work has a significant strategic impact and supports the delivery of the National Performance Framework outcomes.

Collaborative applications made in partnership with other organisations are encouraged. Projects might link up services on a geographical basis, provide complementary services or other new ways to combine strengths to support autistic peoples' diagnostic journeys.

Where a partnership includes a statutory service, the lead applicant and primary funding beneficiary must be a third-sector organisation.

Applicants must provide:

- A project budget.
- A copy of their organisation's constitution.
- A copy of their most recent signed statutory accounts/
- A copy of their partnership agreement (for partnership applications).

Only one application per organisation is permitted.



Restrictions

Statutory services are not eligible to apply.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is for projects and activities that meet all the following requirements:

- The project supports autistic adults.
 - Support for adults aged 18 years and over who have received an autism diagnosis, who are awaiting assessment, or who self-identify as autistic. Projects supporting the families and carers of autistic adults are eligible.
- The project meets a need or fills a gap in provision.
 - Provide evidence of need for the project, such as how it fills a gap in current service provision or knowledge base. Services should be provided free of charge to autistic adults and their families and carers.
- Autistic people are meaningfully involved.
 - Projects involve autistic lived experience in the development of the projects. All projects will be strengths-based and focus on making the most of and building upon the skills and experiences of autistic people, as well as assets within communities.
- The organisation works in partnership.
 - Groups are not required to be part of a formal partnership but must demonstrate a good understanding of what others are doing locally and have good working relationships.
- The project supports the programme outcomes:
 - Adults who have received an autism diagnosis or who self-identify as autistic access support to help with their understanding of autism and their next steps.
 - Families and carers of autistic adults feel their family member has effective support to allow them to process and better understand what it means to be autistic.
 - Autistic adults who access this support feel that it helps their well-being.
 - Families and carers of autistic adults who access support for themselves feel that it helps their well-being.
 - Scottish Government obtains additional insight into what works for autistic people and how to address gaps in support.
 - Partnerships with Health and Social Care Partnerships (HSCPs) are developed to deliver sustainable local models of post-diagnostic support.
- The project will measure progress to understand the difference being made.
- The project is inclusive of all autistic people.
 - Projects should consider the physical, social, or economic challenges people might have in accessing support, and if there are ways to overcome these challenges to ensure the widest range of people can participate.
- Projects must have a robust safeguarding framework and practice.
 - Groups should demonstrate best practices on safeguarding adults, and a clear commitment to relevant professional standards, accreditation, governance, and training requirements for safe, appropriate delivery. Proposed work must also be trauma aware.

Proposals for larger grant awards must also:



- Make a strategic impact.
 - The project should support relevant strategic outcomes and contribute to the development of knowledge and practice in the sector, specifically improving the lives of autistic people.
- Support larger numbers of people.
- Integrate with statutory services for delivery of autism supports, services, and diagnoses.
 - Demonstrate how the project will work with the local provision of support to autistic adults and a relationship/plan with the local Health and Social Care Partnership is in place.
- Have a sustainability strategy.

Successful projects will:

- Meaningfully involve autistic people in the development, design, and delivery of the activity.
- Be strengths-based, making the most of, and building on, the skills and experiences of autistic people and assets within communities.
- Work in partnership, with a good understanding of what others are doing locally, complementing, and adding value to other relevant activities in the area.

Additionally, successful proposals for large grants will:

- Integrate with statutory services, showing clear partnerships and collaboration with Health and Social Care Partnerships (HSCPs) to deliver joined-up support by autistic people.

Eligible costs include:

- Revenue costs: day-to-day operational costs associated with project delivery. Requests for small amounts of capital funding to purchase or upgrade physical items essential to the delivery of the project will also be considered.
- Core costs: full cost recovery will be considered, including overhead costs as well as direct project costs (up to a 10% contribution to core overhead costs).
- Evaluation costs: costs to help review progress and monitor or map the journey of the project, including a contribution towards salary costs or reasonable costs toward external evaluation.
- Participation costs: accessible venue spaces, communications materials, childcare, transport, refreshments etc.

Funding is available for projects taking place from October 2023 until the end of March 2024.

Scotland.

How To Apply

There is a two-stage application process:

- Groups must first submit an online expression of interest form.
- Successful groups will then be invited to submit a full application.



The deadline for applications is 13 September 2023 (**midday**).

Applicants will be notified of any decisions made in October 2023.

Autistic Adult Support Fund - Inspiring Scotland % %

UKSAR Volunteer Training Fund

Funding body:	Charities Aid Foundation (CAF)
Maximum value:	Discretionary
Application deadline:	14/11/2023

Grants are available for charitable search and rescue (SAR) organisations across the UK to support training costs and activities for operational volunteers.

Background

The UKSAR Volunteer Training Fund is provided and administered by Charities Aid Foundation (CAF).

Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to support search and rescue (SAR) volunteering activities by providing support for the costs of volunteers' operational training to help improve the safety and quality of SAR services in the UK.

Value Notes

Grants starting from £1,000 are available.

Match Funding Restrictions

Funding can support up to 50% of training costs.

Who Can Apply

UK charitable SAR organisations seeking support to train their volunteers can apply.

The following umbrella organisations can make global applications on behalf of their affiliated groups for core training:

- Association of Lowland Search and Rescue.
- British Cave Rescue Council.
- Mountain Rescue England and Wales.



- Royal Lifesaving Society UK.
- Scottish Mountain Rescue.
- Surf Lifesaving Great Britain.
- Independent Lifeboats (including Independent Lifeboats umbrella body and independent applications from individual organisations affiliated to this umbrella body).

Eligible organisations must:

- Provide both search and rescue services as part of their core activities.
- Provide evidence that their activities are tasked by a statutory authority by providing a tasking letter on a letterhead from the relevant statutory tasking authority.
- Provide search and rescue services on a 24 hours a day, 7 days a week basis (where appropriate).
- Can prove that their training requirements reflect a confirmed operational need in their local area.
- Are a constituted organisation in the UK with a charitable governance document.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Non-charitable organisations.
- Organisations working outside of the UK.
- Organisations that are not able to provide a tasking letter at the time of applying.
- Organisations that are not tasked for search and rescue by the relevant statutory authority and/or not recognised as a viable SAR asset.
- Applications made by individuals.
- Disproportionately sized requests, compared to organisation turnover or activity levels.
- Request for training that is beyond core operational training needs in the current year.
- Requests for activities that are not essential to the training of operational volunteers.
- Equipment not directly related to the provision of training of volunteers.
- Training in the operation of drones.
- Training taking place outside of the UK.
- More than 50% of the total costs of the training.
- Retrospective costs.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding will support SAR organisations with the training costs of operational volunteers to support UK SAR activities.

The training must be a high priority to the organisation and must improve both the capability of the organisation and its volunteers and reflect proven operational needs in a local area.

Applicants must set out why this training is a priority for their volunteers and how this training will benefit the organisation and its UKSAR capabilities.

Proposals should focus on high-quality operational search and rescue training, such as:



- Core skills training for new or existing volunteers, linked to proven operational needs in the local area.
- Avoiding skills fade for existing volunteers, caused by delays or reduction of training opportunities during the pandemic.
- Revalidation of core training for existing volunteers.
- Training which incorporates appropriate well-being approaches.

All training activities must be completed between 1 April 2024 and 31 March 2026.

Eligible training costs include:

- Operational training for SAR volunteers in the UK that directly correlate with specific operational needs in the local area.
- Courses related to the training of operational SAR volunteers that are central to their activities.
- Hiring external trainers for course delivery.
- Administration costs (if essential to training courses).
- Volunteers' travel costs and accommodation where this is integral to the training itself.
- Costs of training equipment (such as manikins or training defibrillators).
- Blue light training (if applicable).
- Up to 50% of the costs of the training.

Athletics Trust Scotland – Transforming Lives Fund

Funding body:	Athletics Trust Scotland

Grants are available for registered charities and constituted organisations to deliver projects and



activities that support people in sports that are disadvantaged across Scotland.

Background

The Transforming Lives Fund is provided and administered by Athletics Trust Scotland.

Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to support organisations delivering projects for people in sports that are in need for reasons of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship, or other disadvantages.

Funding will support underrepresented groups in athletics and running to allow them to increase participation and improve health and well-being in communities across Scotland. Priority will be given to supporting people in low incomes, people who have a disability or those from ethnically and culturally diverse communities.

Value Notes

Grants of between £250 and £1,000 are available.

Who Can Apply

Registered charities and constituted organisations, groups, or clubs can apply.

Groups must provide:

- A copy of their constitution/articles of association/OSCR certificate or other legal status document.
 - A copy of their most independently examined annual accounts that are no older than 18 months old.
-

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Non-constituted organisations.
 - Organisations that are not established as not-for-profit.
 - Organisations that are based outside of Scotland.
 - Organisations applying on behalf of another.
 - Individuals.
 - Capital funding.
 - Retrospective costs.
 - Promotion of religion.
 - Activities that are party political.
 - Work that takes place outside of Scotland.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is for projects and activities that support those in sports who are in need.



Eligible costs include hardship funding, athletics equipment, start-up kits, or coaching fees.

Priority will be given to projects that:

- Support to the lower SIMD areas (1, 2, and 3).
- Will directly expand the running network in targeted areas in Scotland.
- Are specifically targeting underrepresented people in their community.
- Provide increased opportunity for disadvantaged people in Scotland to change their lives through running and athletics.

Funding must be used within 12 months of receiving a grant.

Scottish Government – Cash-First Fund

Funding body:	Scottish Government
Maximum value:	Discretionary
Application deadline:	01/09/2023

Grants are available for public sector and third sector organisations across Scotland to develop partnerships and deliver collaborative work to improve urgent local access to cash in a crisis and tackle food insecurity.

Background

The Cash-First Fund is provided and administered by the Scottish Government to support up to eight local partnerships to collaborate and deliver activities that improve urgent access to cash in a crisis and will generate evidence that can be shared to inform future policy and practice.

The fund and the wider Cash-First Programme are commitments within 'Cash-First: Towards Ending the Need for Food Banks in Scotland'. This plan sets out the Scottish Government's human rights approach to food insecurity and outlines nine collaborative actions to be taken over the next three years.



Objectives of Fund

This fund aims to improve urgent local access to cash in a crisis to help maintain dignity for those supported and reduce the need for emergency food parcels by:

- Providing funding for local collaboration and tests of change.
- Providing practical assistance through tailored advice and peer support.
- Sharing good practice within and beyond the participating areas.
- Independently evaluating the Programme to inform future decisions.

The fund will develop a cash-first response, wherein funding will support people experiencing hardship to improve access to emergency financial assistance as the first port of call in a crisis.

Value Notes

A total of £1.6 million is available.

Up to eight grants of up to £200,000 over two years are available.

Match Funding Restrictions

Match funding is not expected; however, partnerships should consider leveraging wider resources to contribute to any proposed projects and indicate in their application where resources are already in place for linked activities, or where additional resources are being sought.

Who Can Apply

Public and third-sector organisation partnerships can apply.

A partnership can be made up of representatives from local, public, and third-sector services that aid people experiencing financial crisis, who have agreed to work collaboratively towards the objectives of the fund.

Partnerships should include many, if not all, of the following:

- Local food banks and community food initiatives.
- Local money advice services that are delivered by the public or third sector.
- Local authority teams that are the first point of contact for people experiencing financial crisis, including the Scottish Welfare Fund team.
- Other local services that may currently refer to food banks, such as representatives from housing and homelessness, education, health and mental health, social work, and employability.

People with direct experience in accessing crisis support must be involved throughout the work of the Partnership, including the planning stages.

Each application must have a lead partner with the authority to represent their partnership for administration and delivery purposes, such as:



- A public sector body, such as a local authority, health and social care partnership, or NHS health board.
- An incorporated community or voluntary-sector organisation.

To ensure a good geographical spread of activities across Scotland no more than one application from each local authority area is encouraged.

Multiple applications will be considered where the lead partner is an NHS health board with multiple local authorities within their remit.

Restrictions

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Individuals, sole traders, and for-profit organisations (although they can be included as members of a partnership).
- Core and operational costs, other than reasonable costs directly linked to the delivery of eligible activities, such as employing a coordinator.
- Delivering existing services or delivering activities for which funding is already available (unless there is clear additionality to the work and the learning could be integrated into future practice – for example testing a new model of service delivery or targeting an underrepresented group).
- Profit-making, fundraising activities, or activity that results in private gain.
- Contingency costs, loans, endowments, or interest.
- Political or religious activities.
- VAT.
- Statutory requirements.

Eligible Expenditure

Funding is for the delivery of activities that improve urgent access to cash in a crisis in accordance with the fund's objectives, such as:

- Coordination and programme management:
 - Agreeing on a locally shared ambition to improve access to cash in a crisis.
 - Identifying relevant services with high food bank referrals.
 - Facilitating collaboration and improvement between services.
 - Facilitating direct experience participation.
- Trialling new support:
 - Agreeing new cash-first pathways for services with a high rate of food bank referrals, for example, work with
 - housing associations.
 - Targeted activities within specific services, eg cash grants issued by services that are the first point of contact for people experiencing a crisis.
 - Targeted activities for specific at-risk groups, eg rapid cash-first support for families with infants under the age of one.
 - Measures that directly help to overcome specific local barriers to cash-first.
- Evidence gathering and analysis:
 - Understanding and overcoming barriers to cash-first.



- Understanding needs and where to target – including through local measurement of food insecurity.
- Monitoring the impact of interventions.

Wider community food activities such as growing, preparing, sharing, and eating together, may be considered; however, food-based work is not the focus of this fund.

Successful groups will also receive advice from a learning partner and opportunities for peer learning across the Partnership cohort.

Funded activities must be delivered within a 24-month funding period between Autumn 2023 and Autumn 2025.

The deadline for applications is 1 September 2023. No extensions will be granted.

Subject to the number of applications, applicants should be informed of any decisions made at the beginning of October 2023.

The Linnean Society - Our Local Nature Grant Scheme

Summary

The "Our Local Nature" Grants are available to fund innovative projects, designed and led by young people in the UK. It aims to empower young people across the UK to take the lead on projects that involve their local nature and natural spaces.

The grant is purposefully broad and welcomes novel ideas. Examples of possible proposals include:

- running a school festival about nature



- painting community murals showcasing biodiversity in the area
- building a community garden
- creating a nature walk
- hiring a speaker to come and talk about local foraging.

Adult applicants should develop their proposal alongside young people and the projects should seek to affect change or empower local young people and their surrounding communities to increase access to natural spaces and improve understanding of the local biodiversity.

Who can apply

Individuals and organisations who are linked with a group of young people within the UK. This includes, but is not limited to, school staff, student groups, home education groups, community groups and small charities. The fund is provided by the Scottish Government and managed by SCVO. The objective of the fund is to provide capital funding to CLD organisations across Scotland to purchase digital devices that can be used by learners to support their learning.



Digital devices must be used by learners to support them in their learning. Ownership of devices must be retained by the applying organisation for their lifetime. Devices should be used to support learners and can include items such as:

- Laptops
- Tablets
- Monitors
- Cameras
- Mi-fi dongles (hardware only, not data)

Funds should be spent by 31 March 2024. An evaluation report will be due by 30 June 2024.

The aims of the programmes are:

- Fostering greater collaboration
- Exploring new models of innovative practice

Who can apply

In order to be eligible, applicants must:

- Be aged 18 or over



- Be based in one of the four nations of the UK
- Be a creative practitioner working in the arts and creative industries or an organisation working in the arts and creative industries
- Have a UK bank account in their name

You must also have:

- Confirmed commitment from at least one artistic or creative partner based in another of the four nations and;
- Commitment from an international artistic or creative partner (this can be an individual or an organisation). The fund will prioritise international partnerships within Europe.

When to apply

The deadline for applications is 28 September 2023.
